✓ 1020-SR-BWR Business Waste Reduction Program	Commercial waste reduction is encouraged as part of CCCSWA outreach, including site audits performed by the franchised hauler, print and online outreach, and public education conducted by CCCSWA staff and contractors. Source reduction activities are not tracked by weight at this time. CCCSWA initiated two contracts to encourage 1) the use of reusables for in house dining and, 2) the use of reusables for take out.



✓ 1040-SR-SCH School Source Reduction Programs	CCCSWA schools outreach program includes instruction and assistance on recycling, organics recycling, and source reduction. The Agency has begun working with Sodexo who serves some of the schools to use reusables during lunch.
✓ 1050-SR-GOV Government Source Reduction Programs	CCCSWA and member agency staff practice paper reduction through double-sided copying and use of emails. Staff members also use reusable ceramic cups, plates, and utensils in break rooms. Use of tablets and laptops that contain meeting agendas and documents are also used.
☑ 2030-RC-OSP Commercial On-Site Pickup	Single stream recycling collection is offered to all businesses. Services are provided at no additional cost. Commercial recyclables are taken to Mt. Diablo Resource Recovery in Pittsburg CA for processing. CCCSWA passed Ordinance No. 15 -1, the Administrative Citation Ordinance, in 2016. Reported weight includes both commercial and multi-family collected tons.
	Self haul tons are represented under other programs (tires, biomass, etc.)
	The CCCSWA Schools Outreach Program assists students, teachers, and school staff to participate in waste prevention, recycling and composting activities. Weekly and as-needed recycling and organics service is provided by Republic Services at no additional cost. The CCCSWA uses a 3rd party contractor to implement the schools outreach program, which includes, among other elements, school assemblies and lesson plans, bins and other supplies, the Wastebusters award program to recognize schools that have achieved milestones in waste prevention and recycling, a high school senior internship program, and waste diversion scholarships for high school seniors. Tons is recyclable materials only.
☑ 2060-RC-GOV Government Recycling Programs	CCCSWA Member Agencies routinely recycle mixed paper, office paper, newspaper, cardboard and containers in their office/admin areas. Signs are used in photocopy areas and break rooms as reminders. Many desks and work areas have dedicated recycling collection containers. Maintenance areas separate scrap metal, asphalt/concrete, green waste, motor oil, e-waste, and vehicle batteries for recycling. Collected weights are not recorded at this time

Source separated food material is taken to the EBMUD Water Treatment Facility in Oakland for digestion where resulting biogas is captured and burned to produce electricity. Commingled organic materials (green waste, food scraps, uncoated food soiled paper) from other commercial and MF customers are collected separately from the commercial food scrap program are composted at the Forward Composting Facility outside of Manteca. The tons from the commingled commercial organics program are reported under program 3035.
☑ 3050-CM-SCH School Composting Programs	Schools can participate in both organics recycling programs CCCSWA provides. Schools send organics to Forward compost facility or to EBMUD for digestion. Republic Services and the CCCSWA schools program team works with each school to assess needs and implement the program.
